Distribution Safeguarding Template

Distributions are a key activity for many of our partners working in the COVID-19 response. In order to ensure that this activity is safe, we have prepared a template for partners to complete. Through this template we hope that partners will be encouraged to think though the safeguarding elements of their activity, and that in submitting their response can reassure the Fund Manager that distributions will be engaged in in a safe way. All projects should complete sections 1-4. Projects should then complete the additional relevant sections if distributing hygiene/dignity kits, food/nutrition or cash/bursaries.

1. Assessment	1. What is your understanding of the access and control of the resources you will distribute in the home and in the community? Will girls/target beneficiaries be able to control the resource? Will access to this resource increase risk of violence? How will the project mitigate against this?	
	2. How will you conduct distribution site observations and perform safety mapping of the site to ensure that girls/target beneficiaries are able to access and leave the site with resource, safely?	
	3. Taking into account the context that COVID-19 creates, including social distancing, how will the project involve women and girls in the planning, preparation, distribution and monitoring process for this intervention?	
	4. In what ways will the project plan to mitigate against the risk of COVID-19 contraction during distributions?	

1. What will be the ratio of men to women in the distribution team?	
2. Are strategies in place to accompany those at risk of gender-based violence (GBV) if necessary? What are these?	
3. Are services being offered at times that are convenient and safe for travel?	
4. Have measures been taken to avoid long waiting periods for distribution?	
5. How will the project manage distributions and social distancing?	
6. Are delivery sites designed to ensure accessibility for all persons, including those with disabilities (e.g. physical disabilities, injuries, visual or other sensory impairments)?	
7. Will safeguarding officers/focal points be present at distributions?	
8. How will you ensure access and distribution is equitable? What will be the criteria and how will this be communicated to the community to avoid conflict?	
9. How will pregnant and lactating mothers be able to access the distribution safely? Will there be additional nutrition support available for them?	
10. How will mothers (in particular lone parent mothers) access the distribution? Will support be made available?	
11. How will the project increase the promotion of reporting mechanisms and promote behaviour protocols around distributions?	
12. Will distribution staff be trained in safeguarding and referrals and be background checked to the appropriate level?	

Other	1. How will the project verify that the girls/beneficiaries they distribute to are the correct people in a way which does not breach data protection?

	4. Have you factored in additional costs that some households may have (girls with disabilities, mothers etc) and ensured that cash distribution is equitable?
